Pandemic and Endemic in East Asian History

Professor Wataru Iijima (Aoyama Gakuin University)

Abstract

In a very famous book *Plagues and Peoples*, Prof. W. H. McNeill discusses that there was a lot of prevalence of infectious diseases in the history of East Asia such as smallpox. It is very interesting and important that we have a lot of epidemics in reality or we know many of them from huge records in history books like *Twenty-Four Histories*, the official histories of past Chinese dynasties. Which answer is right?

McNeill also confirms the fundamental situation of epidemics in China by the information in the book *Epidemics in China*, a check List is compiled by Joseph H. Cha, Prof. of Far Eastern History, Quincy College. Unfortunately, we do not know more about Prof. Cha, but the source material was Ch'en Kao-yung, *Chung Kuo Li Tai Tien Tsai Jen Huo Piao*, a 2 vols. Edition published in Shanghai in 1940. Consulting with this reference, McNeill examines the pandemic of bubonic plague in the late Yuan period and discusses the transfer of bubonic plague from Yunnan to the whole of China due to the military invasion of the Mongol Empire, and later from China to Europe through the Silk Road. As a result, McNeill raises very famous speculation that the origin of the Black Death in Medieval Europe was in East Asia, specifically the Yunnan region.

An idea of McNeill was also based on the research works by Wu Lien-teh, a scientist has later named Plague fighter in the history, such as Wu Lien-teh, Chun, J. W., Pollitzer, R. & Wu, C. Y., *Plague: a manual for medical and public health workers*, in Shanghai in 1936. Dr. Wu worked as a Chinese medical specialist and played a very important role at the Manchurian Plague Prevention Bureau for the establishment of the public health system in the first half of twentieth-century China. But Wu estimated the origin of the Black Death was not Yunnan, it could be the regions of Central Asia. McNeill alters Wu's explanation of plague transmission to his speculation based on the records and hypothesis of plague pandemic in Hong Kong and South China around 1894. The Maritime Customs Reports of the late 19th century indicated Yunnan should be the epic center of the contagious plague during the late nineteenth century. The origin of the Black Death of Medieval Europe is still a controversial issue in the history of infectious diseases.

Based on the new researches of Prof. Monica Green, In her edited masterpiece Pandemic

Disease in the Medieval World, The Medieval Globe, Vol.1, she criticized the Yunnan model of McNeill based on the new DNA analysis which reveals more questions and debates.

Furthermore, a couple of endemics for example schistosomiasis and filariasis also has been as important as pandemics in the history of infectious diseases like McNeill previously discussed. A couple of endemics were very serious, but we do not have seen many records in *Twenty-Four Histories*. A very crucial black hole to our study of the history of diseases in China. Endemics has been very problematic to the everyday life of the common people, but only few records were available. Studying them will be our challenge and a good one to improve our understanding of the Chinese and East Asian past.

Dr. Patrick Manson, a medical officer of the Chinese Maritime Customs and worked at the coastal cities in China and Taiwan paid much attention to the endemic diseases in East Asia. In his rich experience, he researched many endemic cases and advanced a study of tropical medicine. After that, he established the London School of Tropical Medicine and was called "the father of tropical medicine." His finding on endemic diseases was advanced based on the cultural and academic exchanges between Western Medicine and Indigenous medicines including traditional Chinese, Korean, and Japanese medical knowledge.

In this presentation I will talk about the epidemic and endemic in the history of infectious disease in East Asia and propose a couple of new research topics.

Wataru Iijima is a professor at the Department of History, College of Literature, Aoyama Gakuin University. As a historian of disease and medicine in East Asia, he has published books and articles in Japanese, English, and Chinese. His major works are *Plague and Modern China* (Kenbun Shuppan, 2000), *The Hidden History of Malaria* (Tokyo University Press, 2005). He is also working to preserve historical materials at the Archives of infectious diseases history.

Niigata Minamata Disease 1965-2021: Social Exclusion, Hidden Victims and the Power of "Folk-Cultural Revisionism"

Professor Reiko Seki (Graduate School of Sociology, Rikkyo University)

Abstract

Niigata Minamata Disease was the second outbreak of Minamata disease, officially announced on June 12, 1965. In this presentation, I will discusses why the polluting factory was located in the upper reaches of the Agano River, why the second Minamata disease occurred, who were the victims of this disease, and why the lawsuit is still pending more than half a century after the outbreak. The Niigata Minamata disease was "the starting point for making pollution a social issue". On the other hand, because Minamata disease was a social exclusionary disease, the victims were hiding and did not want to talk about their physical problems or even the fact that they had eaten river fish. Therefore, in the lawsuit currently being filed by the victims, the defendant argues that "it was not common for people of the Agano River basin to eat river fish". In short, the power to reduce the scope of the victims creates a fake discourse that distorts the local food culture.

Reiko Seki is a professor at the College of Sociology, Rikkyo University. As an environmental sociologist, she has been interested in empirical research on environmental pollutions (especially Niigata Minamata Disease), environmental problems caused by development, and damage from and the Fukushima Nuclear Power Accident.

East Asian Environmental History & Contemporary Global Environmental Challenges

Professor R. Bin Wong (UCLA)

Abstracts

Environmental history and economic history are each prominent in global history, but their connections have been infrequently considered as the complex and challenging linkages between environment and economy we understand today. The irrelevance of history to our present environmental predicament seems supported by admonitions that the past is no longer a reliable guide to the future. Social-ecological systems (SES) are complex non-linear systems in which the future cannot be predicted through conventional statistical modeling of historical data. But this does not exhaust the reasons for turning to environmental history in order to face present-day environmental challenges. In this presentation, I'll first consider what adopting an early modern historical vantage point can offer on contemporary dissatisfaction with levels of per capita income as indicators of human satisfaction; contemporary ideas about well-being confirm a sensibility of material limitation familiar to people before the modern era. Second, even if many of us have become critical of modern era economic excesses and suspicious of the ways in which economic decision making disregards environmental consequences, we can still gain better understanding of how past economic and political governance principles and practices have created the fragile environmental conditions we face today. I will argue that the likelihood of coping successfully with climate change can be improved if we understand our path-dependent possibilities. Third, because the environmental histories of different world regions have been shaped by particular combinations of physical environments, economic development, and state policies influencing human exploitation of the environment, path-dependent processes of changed governance differ across the globe. This means that East Asian environmental history can offer distinctive insights that complement and extend those already gained from environmental histories of other world regions.

R. Bin Wong, Distinguished Professor of History, UCLA, has published more than one hundred articles or book chapters appearing in Chinese, English, French, German and Japanese. Among his book publications, he is author of *China Transformed: Historical Change and the Limits of European Experience*, co-author (w/ J-L Rosenthal) of *Before and Beyond Divergence: the Politics of Economic Change in China and Europe*; and coeditor (w/ Masayuki Tanimoto) of *Public Goods Provision in the Early Modern Economy: Comparative Perspectives from Japan, China, And Europe*. He currently studies historical and contemporary natural resource governance regimes in China, the E.U. and the U.S.


